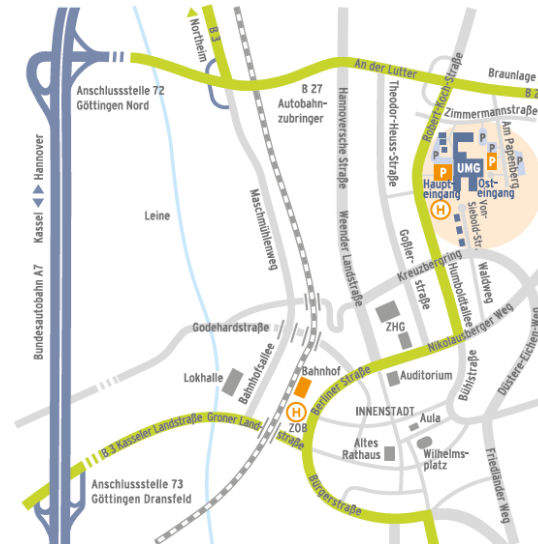

GRUSSWORT

Korean medicine (KM) has been largely influenced by TCM but has developed its own unique diagnostic and treatment features. KM does not focus on explicit symptoms but on the specific characteristics of the individuals who are suffering from diseases.

The *Donguibogam*, an encyclopaedia of medical knowledge and treatment techniques compiled in Korea in 1613 summarizes competing contemporary theories of medicine that had accumulated in East Asia for two millennia. It went on to integrate medical knowledge and clinical experiences together in a single collection of volumes. In 2009, UNESCO added the work to its cultural heritage list. The herbal prescriptions listed in this work form the basis for modern KM practice.

Today, with the rapid increase in the prevalence of chronic diseases, there is growing evidence that herbal medicine such as Korean medicine can be an answer. As the focus of medical demand is shifting from treatment to prevention of diseases and improvement of quality of life, traditional herbal medicines represent an individualized multitarget therapy which has the potential for further contribution for public health. This symposium discusses current historical and scientific knowledge and opens new fields of scientific inquiry.

- 14:00 – **Book donation ceremony with short introduction on Korean Medicine (KM): its history and current features**
14:30 **Dr. Park, Inhyo** (PhD in Sociology, Pusan National University Research Institute for Korean Medicine) introduces Korean medical books including the *Donguibogam*, one of the most important classics of KM, followed by a short introductory presentation on the history and current features of KM.

16:20 **Dr. Han, Jaebok** (MD & KMD, PhD, director of Nur hospital, Seoul) focuses on single or multiple herbal formulas for the treatment of cancer itself and patients' symptoms derived from cancer, as well as introducing the clinical setting surrounding herbal medicinal care in South Korea.

Prof. Kim, Wonnam (PhD, KMD, Semyung University, College of KM) introduces an experimental overview of herbal medicines on complications due to cancer and its treatment.
